2017 was a massive year for us at Hope Global. We took fewer people into development projects as in previous years, and we have had to re look at all of our delivery systems which has actually been a wonderful gift to us as an organisation. Our mission remains the same and actually we are just incredibly excited about the opportunities in front of us.

Hope Global is a faith based non-profit organisation that exists to restore hope and justice to countries that have been devastated by genocide, war and poverty.

Our goal is to partner with local organisations to offer practical solutions to overcoming poverty, through the empowerment and equipping of local people. HOPE is a global initiative uniting individuals, churches, schools, professionals and organisations from all over the world to be part of the answer in bringing hope to developing nations in a way that is practical and sustainable.

OUR CONTINUING JOURNEY

The Hope Global Education project arose from a recognition that teachers in post conflict and impoverished countries haven't always had access to training and professional development that teachers here in Australia and other countries take for granted.

An investment in teachers and the quality of teaching impacts 100's of students in one school in one year and potentially has the opportunity to improve the education for generations.

Hope Global Education project sends teams of experienced qualified teachers, ICT trainers and healthcare workers to deliver teacher professional development according to identified needs.

Currently Hope Global Education project is sending teams into Rwanda, Kenya, Cambodia and India.

In Rwanda, Hope Global Education project has had a presence for over ten years, delivering teacher and curriculum development in different parts of the education sector as Rwanda has recovered from the genocide, the gap between

quality education in urban and rural areas is widening. Hope Global Education in Rwanda is working with partners on the ground to ensure a child in a village in rural Rwanda still has access to a quality education

In India, whilst education is highly valued, opportunities to access experienced teachers and quality education can be different according to wealth, caste and location. Hope Global Education is working with partners in Hyderabad to deliver professional development to teachers from a range of social and economic backgrounds and is one of the very few NDO's still available to work in the country.

We are working hard to raise capital to purchase our first teacher training centre in Kigali, Rwanda.. and hopefully we will have purchased our building by end of 2018.

MAKING A DIFFERENCE IN CAMBODIA

Friends and family have asked me “Why volunteer with Hope Global?” Why not another organisation?” I think the main reason for me choosing Hope Global to volunteer with is that Hope Global does not go into a lesser developed country with a program and says, “Look at how great how program is. You must use it. It will be of great benefit to you.” Hope Global asks, “How can we best serve you? What are your needs and how can best support you?”. That is what we are doing at Hope Global. We come along side, shoulder to shoulder and heart to heart with teachers, trainers, NGO’s in lesser developed nations to bring about change. To make their world and the world of the children that they teach a better world.

This is something I believe in passionately. That education is a basic human right. That every child in the world has the right and should have the opportunity to have a basic education. Education, more than any other factor has a powerful impact in helping a nation climb out of poverty. The Hope Global Education program comes alongside existing schools and education delivery organisations in developing countries to equip

and empower teachers, nurses and other staff and professionals. By training the teachers, Hope Global impacts thousands of children, giving them a better future. A sufficiently trained teacher will impact the quality of education for around 60-70 students per year. Over 5 years, that one teacher will teach up to 350 students. If 150 teachers are trained and their skills improved, the quality of education for 52,500 students is improved over 5 years. This is an investment in the future generations of a nation. Education has the power to change a nation. Nelson Mandela said: “Education is the most powerful weapon which you can use to change the world.” Kofi Annan had this to say about education: “Education is a human right with immense power to transform. On its foundation rest the cornerstones of freedom, democracy and sustainable human development.”

In the past few years the response has been a request to partner in teacher development that would build community, strength and unity amongst Christian Schools in the region as well as equip and resource teachers with new knowledge and skills to extend their teaching practices.

MAKING A DIFFERENCE IN KENYA

In July 2017, two trainers partnered with Manasprings, an organisation established by an Australian, Carey Westwood and her friend Wanjiru Waitaka. Manasprings supports women community leaders throughout Kenya - the leaders of small grassroots organisations who carry the burden for the orphan, vulnerable child, single mother and impoverished families.

These women are courageous and committed to their local communities by building schools, shelters for homeless children, developing programs and safe houses for children with disabilities and homes for children rescued before they were trafficked.

Over 80 women participated in two conferences, one at Tenderfeet school next to the Kibera slum, the largest slum in Kenya and the other at Fountain of Hope church in eastern Nairobi. The training covered Working with Traumatized Children, Women in Leadership and First Aid.

Both conferences were a wonderful time of sharing experiences for the women as each face similar difficulties in their own context, many having travelled long distances to attend. The unity displayed by these women was amazing and it was commented that there are very few opportunities for the different tribal groups (42 tribes in Kenya) to work together.

During the training the women were gifted pamper packs with hand cleanser, moisturiser and nail polish as well as participating in a pamper session, so much laughter and joy.

MAKING A DIFFERENCE IN RWANDA

Our first day at Fruits of Hope Academy vocational school we painted the tables and chairs that the students made for Ruhinga Christian Academy. While we painted, the students were making bookshelves.

This school is in very close proximity to the wood markets and all the students that have attended have been able to gain employment there. The Hope team provided the wood and paint but all the labour is done by the students, often working late into the night to get the job finished.

The following day we travelled out to the Eastern Province to Ruhinga and the school and community centre that has been established by Nicholas and Elsie Hitimana. This is the village where Elsie grew up and where most of her family were killed during the 1994 Genocide of the Tutsi.

We began teaching English greetings, meeting the children and introducing the Days for Girls program to the women who would be attending, a vital program to ensure that girls continue with their education after reaching puberty.

The program also provides important information on sexual health and reproductive health.

The team had purchased five sewing machines and these were delivered to the Community Centre where the training would take place the following week with the Days for Girls Trainers from Uganda and our friend, Alice who has been assisting us with translation for six years.

We also screened some of the community women for vision problems and provided them with reading glasses. While these women are illiterate their glasses made their life easier with their craft and sewing activities.


We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.
